Golisano Community Engagement Center

The Center is currently under construction and will house training programs, including the College's Community Institutes, and provide easy access to Career Development and Student Life resources. The building will provide centralized meeting space and community interaction opportunities for all students — traditional undergraduates, commuters, adult students, and students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. This center will provide student-centered spaces for studying and collaborating on group assignments. Roberts Wesleyan's Community Institutes, which provide custom educational solutions and resources to Rochester-area businesses and organizations, offer certificate and training programs separate from the degree-based education the college already offers. The institutes are a go-to resource for businesses, government, health care administration, law enforcement, school districts and churches.

SPIRITUAL LIFE

After having all of its programming online due to the pandemic, the Spiritual Life Office was thrilled to get back to gathering in person for Chapel and other Spiritual Formation events this year. Using student feedback from surveys to tailor their programs, the Spiritual Life team continued with the Monday Roberts Kickstart videos, designated Wednesdays as the time to gather for our Community Chapel, and brought back the popular Cafe Chapel on Fridays. In addition to Spiritual Life programming, four Campus Ministry groups were relaunched and one new group added. The Spiritual Life Office continued its partnership with Athletics and collaborated with various sports teams to hold bible studies and devotional times. This year, it has been amazing to see students eager to participate and attend these events and we celebrate the support from Athletics! In conjunction with all of these efforts, Pastor G and Jae Newman, create programming aligned to the College's Christian heritage. While students at Roberts are active agents in their transformation, they are supported by the Spiritual Life team who are personally present and act as guiding mentors as students build their faith and future forward.

REDHAWKS

The 16 Redhawks teams pieced together their most successful seasons competing in NCAA Division II athletic programs and the East Coast Conference (ECC). After missing the fall 2020 season due to COVID-19, the athletics teams were excited to be back to competition in 2021. Following a tremendous winter sports season that saw the women's basketball team win the conference and make a Sweet 16 appearance, and the women's bowling team capture a conference title and national championship bid, the Redhawks spring 2021 and fall 2021 athletic seasons proved to be two of the most successful in the College's history and most accomplished since joining NCAA Division II. The Redhawks put together an outstanding 2021 season, including seven conference championships.

The women's lacrosse team was the highlight of last spring as the Redhawks advanced to the NCAA Division II National Championships Final Four. The Redhawks finished the season 14-2, which is the best record in program history. Roberts won the Conference Championship and NCAA Regional Championship to advance to the final four before falling to the eventual NCAA national champion in the semifinals.

The athletes worked together to serve the community and connect with people to make a difference. The Redhawks Reach Out program gave back to the community by supporting the Pirate Toy Fund and Pearce Church Thanksgiving Food Drive, and by helping the class of 2025 move in.
